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From the Director - Traff Doherty

As I'm writing this, we are just entering the third month of winter and again I am reminded of just how fortunate we are to be located in the Southern Tier of New York State. Elmira is just far enough south to miss out on the lake effect snow that we associate with such "Winter Wonderlands" as Buffalo, Rochester and Oswego. There they measure snow in feet; we measure it in inches! Also, our location is far enough west to put us on the fringes of the big "nor'easters" that clobber New York City, Boston and New England. (note: I see that certain parts of California have recently faced snowfall predictions of up to 12 feet – I can't imagine that!) It's not that I'm down on winter - it just makes running a museum (on the top of a steep hill) a lot more challenging. It has been a good winter in terms of visitors; I continue to be amazed by visitors who are willing to brave some very unpleasant driving conditions to come up and see us!

We have reached a bit of a milestone in that our Restoration Shop is seeing the completion of, what I believe to be our first major restoration. Five years ago, HHSC members, Rob Whitcomb and Dave Corcoran entered into a partnership to purchase a 1965 1-26 - s/n 320. After flying it a bit, they decided to address some areas that needed attention and they approached me about using our Shop. I was delighted. Heretofore, it was merely *posing* as a restoration shop – as an exhibit area that visitors could peruse, but not get to see any actual work being done. Rob and Dave's 1-26 project was perfect for that purpose. Now the shop would serve as a "living part" of the museum. And that's exactly what was to happen for next four and a half years. I'm especially thankful to Rob and Dave for being so willing to answer the myriad of questions that came their way from our visitors. For me, this was not a new experience; the same phenomenon occurred daily at my former directorship at the Curtiss Museum. Here at NSM, a wonderful job was done on their 1-26 – Dave on the mechanicals and Rob on the covering and finishing. K&L played a role in this, too - there were some structural issues that required their expertise. Rob worked very hard to master the "Stewart System" (his first aircraft covering experience) and the results are beautiful. Another area that he took on was putting together a very sophisticated instrument panel (at least by my 1960s standards). This ship is slated to be in the air this spring – and we will be seeking another project for our shop (we do not charge rent).

It turns out that Rob is a bit of a *Renaissance person*. He is a "Blue Water Sailor" who holds a US Coast Guard 100 Ton/Master License and is currently one of a select group of individuals who captain The **Pat II** - a 1924 39' wooden launch, operating as a tour boat on Keuka Lake under the auspices of the *Finger Lakes Boating Museum*. The Finger Lakes Boating Museum, located in some of the former *Taylor Wine Company* buildings (about 2 miles south of Hammondsport), is a must-see for anyone who enjoys wooden boats – of all sizes and descriptions – from a 7' dingy to the 39' Pat II.

Rob was part of a group of volunteers who spent 6 years performing a major restoration on the Pat II and he is currently working at the Boating Museum on his personal project – a 16' wooden K class sailboat. This is a 1941 16' wooden sailboat designed and built by Murray Wright of Dundee, NY.

NEW EXHIBIT ON MEDALS, TROPHIES AND BADGES

Soaring medals, trophies, badges and pins come in all shapes and sizes and the museum has no shortage of examples to display.

While SSA and FAI badges have remained very uniform over the years, soaring trophies can be very artistic and creative. We now have on exhibit some of the best one-of-a-kind soaring trophies ever created.

Established in 1905 in Paris for the regulation of the sport of flying, Federation Aeronautique Internationale ("FAI") established a soaring badge program in the early 1930s. Working with the SSA, which was established in 1932, this badge program continues to this day. Badges acknowledge internationally-recognized levels of soaring achievement.

In this new case we currently have Johnny Robinson's 3-Lennie pin and world diamond #1 and Stan Smith's silver C and Diamond C.

In Memoriam

H. Ray Gimmey

U.S. Soaring Hall of Fame 2000 1933 - 2023



Ray was born in Oklahoma City, OK and graduated from high school in Illinois. After high school he enlisted in the Air Force and served as an aircraft mechanic in Korea. After his discharge in 1955, he attended Southern Illinois University, studying industrial science. He graduated in 1959 and joined American Airlines. After working for a few years, Ray went on to earn an MBA at UC Berkeley

Ray took his first glider ride at Calistoga in April 1964 in a Schweizer 2-22. Two years later he earned his private pilot's license (glider) and commercial license. Three years after this first


flight he founded the Chico Soaring Association and became its president. He began giving flying lessons to members and continued teaching through 1969. He also served as a tow pilot. He flew his first competition, Region 11, in 1967. In 1968 he flew the 1-26 Nationals at Pearblossom, CA. In 1970 he flew the first FAI Open Class Nationals, placing 15 with an SHK1.

Ray qualified for the World Gliding Team eleven times from 1981 to 2001 but chose not to take part in 1997. He was National Champion in four classes of competition - Open (1972, 1984, 1986, 1991, 1995, 1997), 15-M (1981, 1994, 2006, 2014), Standard (1976, 1988) and Sports (1989, 2010).

In addition to all the Nationals he has flown, he also flew by invitation in the 1973 Smirnoff Derby and the three Masters of Soaring (1986 at Minden, NV, 1987 at Estrella, AZ, 1988 at Winterhaven, FL)

Ray Gimmey earned the du Pont Trophy in 1972, 1984, 1986, 1991, 1995, 1997; Standard Class Trophy in 1976, 1988; Schreder 15-Meter Trophy in 1981, 1994, 2006, 2014; Lattimore Trophy in 2010; Stroukoff Trophy in 1984, 1986, 1991, 2012; Giltner in 1990, 1997; Hatcher Trophy in 1997; and Sports 1998. He holds Silver #1232 earned in 1967, Gold #417 in 1968, Diamond #142 (Intl # 859) in 1970.

"Ray won numerous nationals and represented the US in world competition, but perhaps he is best remembered for winning the Open Nationals in 1973. The hot ship of the day was the ASW-12 and several were at Minden and so was the new guy, Ray Gimmey, flying a standard class 201 Libelle. On the last day of the competition conditions were weak and most contestants were slogging their way around a difficult task, but Ray held back, waiting for better conditions. About 4 PM, CU's started popping and Ray made his move! He won the last day and the contest!" – John Sinclair

Thomas L. Knauff

U.S. Soaring Hall of Fame 1997 1938 - 2024



In 1975, he and wife and partner, Doris Grove (also an accomplished soaring pilot and Hall of Fame member), established a commercial operation and catalog store at Ridge Soaring Gliderport in Pennsylvania located at the base of the Bald Eagle Ridge.

Tom was the first glider pilot to fly 750 km and 1000 km triangle

It is with great sadness that we share the news that Tom Knauff passed away on Wednesday, February 21, 2024 at Mt. Nittany Medical Centre, State College, PA. Tom's contributions to the art of soaring, both locally and internationally, were extraordinary. As co-owner and operator of Ridge Soaring Gliderport, he elevated the professionalism and safety of the sport. He set high standards as a flight instructor, authored numerous flight training books, hosted safety seminars, and was an FAA Designated Pilot Examiner.

Tom was an early pioneer of ridge soaring in the Appalachians in the early 1960s, ultimately setting five world records flying gliders there. He was the stunt pilot in the 1999 film, <u>The Thomas Crown Affair</u>.



course flights in the United States, and was the first to fly 1000 km with a passenger. His 1,647 km (1,023 mi) out-and-return flight in 1983 was the world's longest glider flight at the time, stood as a world record for nearly 20 years, and is still a U.S. national record. He has set more than 50 other U.S. National soaring records.

His glider flight training manuals, *Glider Basics from First Flight to Solo* and *Glider Basics from Solo to License* are the most popular in the U.S., and he was one of the most respected glider flight instructors in the world. He was one of the few FAA designated pilot examiners authorized to issue initial flight instructor certificates.

Tom was a frequent speaker at soaring events and has published many articles in Soaring magazine from 1978 to the present. He has also utilized the excellent soaring ridge to set many records, has participated in enumerable national competitions often placing in the top ten including a win in the 1989 National Open Class and has competed on the world level.
